

Mysore Chocolate Mousse with Timur Pepper: Silken, light and rich with flavor, nothing ends a meal like the perfect chocolate mousse. And with the tiniest kick of Timur pepper, ours is positively gourmet. Try it at Fire, The Park New Delhi, or whip it up for yourself with our easy to follow recipe.

Ingredients:

600 grams single-origin Mysore chocolate 100 grams cream 16 egg whites 8 egg yolks 150 grams sugar 5 grams Timur pepper

Method:

 Melt the single-origin Mysore chocolate on a double boiler and keep aside.
Warm the cream and gently mix it into the melted chocolate.
Make a sabayon by adding 100 grams of sugar to the egg yolks and cook it on a double boiler, stirring constantly until it reaches a custard-like consistency.
Gently fold the sabayon into the melted chocolate and cream mixture. 5. Whip the egg whites with 50 grams of sugar until it forms stiff peaks.
6. Fold the whipped egg whites into the chocolate mixture.
7. Crush the Timur pepper and add to the mix.
8. Pour the final mixture into a bowl or individual

glasses and leave to set in the refrigerator for about two hours. 9. Serve cold.

Nikhil Mehta's Black Box Okhla is a laboratory for exploration and performance. Converted from an abandoned factory in Okhla, it offers a space that is as much part of the show as the performance. The factory's unique architecture inspires environmental experiences that are impossible to create at traditional performance venues. So space, the environment created to tell a story, becomes an integral part of theatre. In fact, Black Box Okhla is built on the principle that space is the fundamental differentiator between films and live performance. This state-of-the-art theatre is completely flexible. Theatre-makers can choose the kind of audience-performance interaction to fit their story telling. Here, no two shows ever look the same. Black Box Okhla is the result of the essential reimagining that Mehta believes Delhi theatre needs. And this just might be the revolutionary approach that will help audiences understand communal experiences in the digital age. It's curtains up on yet another path-breaker.





Hanif Kureshi is creating art on every street corner. And, with St+art India Foundation, he introduces larger audiences to the rich artistic history preserved by wall art. His own art has been showcased in Biennales all over the world, and he was named one of the 50 most influential young Indians by GQ.

Many of Delhi's historically important centres have re-emerged as contemporary hubs. Because of this, visiting the past histories of the city, reimagined, and specifically that of street art is an incredible way to experience it.

Lodhi Colony is the last colony the British built before Partition. It is flanked on all sides by markets, monuments and cultural centres and features work by exemplary International and Indian artists like Borondo, Gaia, Daku, Shoe and Lady Aiko.

Telling artworks can be found in the recesses of the Shahpur Jat village undiscovered by designer stores and visitors. Discovering iconic artworks

by Tona, Bond, Tofu and Alias here also opens doors to the old cloth-dyeing and tailor shops, unearthing its intrinsically artistic lineage.

Hauz Khas is an important marker of heritage and culture. The famous Wall of Fame features years of writing by various graffiti artists, establishing Hauz Khas as a haunt for the underground street art scene. It hosts famous murals such as the Totem by Okuda, as well as work by infamous Delhi graffiti writers such as Zero and Daku.
